WHAT IS A PEDALS, PIPES, & PIZZA?

A Pedals, Pipes, & Pizza (PPP) event is a low-cost, partial day program designed to give children and youth a brief introduction to the pipe organ and its music. The event is held at a church, auditorium, or other space housing a pipe organ. It is desirable for the featured organ to have a console visible to the attendees.

While this program can focus on one organ, do not hesitate to include several to show different designs of instruments. Many PPP coordinators have found it instructive to introduce the organ by performing an organ demonstration piece such as *Rex: The King of Instruments* for organist and narrator. Other possibilities are found in the resource section on pages 12 and 13. In addition, be sure to have plenty of other volunteers and players available for the event.

Although the organ is the main focus of a PPP, time for social interaction among the attendees and the program coordinators and volunteers is strongly encouraged. This will be especially important during the “pizza” portion of the event.

Additional helpful hints and suggestions are provided in this booklet as well as examples of the materials needed to conduct successful PPP.

PLANNING GUIDES

POSSIBLE ACTIVITIES TO SCHEDULE AT YOUR PEDALS, PIPES, & PIZZA

I. Activities Away from the Organ:

- show video: *The Organist, a Total Musician* (see resources)
- show video: *Pulling Out All the Stops* (see resources)

II. Activities at the Organ:

*During the demonstration, it may be helpful to have one person to demonstrate and play each organ and a second person to interact and talk with the students. *Be sure to leave enough time for questions before, during, and after the various demonstrations.*

- (1) ● demonstrate differences between organ and piano with one student at the organ and the other at the piano. Play one note with little pressure, then with great pressure. Hold one note a long time on each instrument.
- (2) ● demonstrate loudest, softest, highest and lowest sounds on the organ. (More possibilities than any other single instrument!) Be sure to demonstrate each basic tone color with short excerpts incorporating soft and loud; fast and slow.
- (3) ● show pictures or describe largest and smallest organ pipes. Give old organ pipe to each student if possible. (Be sure they play. Frequently organ builders or repair people are willing to donate pipes no longer in use.)
- (4) ● demonstrate the swell box. (Students “ah” at a steady rate with hand over mouth - take away gradually.) Then play on full swell, open and gradually close, then on a soft stop, open and slowly closed, then open.
- (5) ● play a passage going from ppp to fff to ppp, using both stop additions/subtractions and swell pedal.
- (6) ● demonstrate pedals. Play pedal solo piece, such as the melody of *Three Blind Mice*, *Mary Had a Little Lamb*, or *Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star*. Consider playing a piece suitable to the age group present.
- (7) ● demonstrate need for stops (why not called “go’s”) by playing with much emotion on a silent manual.
- (8) ● secretly turn off organ motor, pull stops, and play. The lack of sound emphasizes the fact that the organ is a wind instrument.
- (9) ● demonstrate pistons, couplers, etc., possibly with a brief demonstration of the organist trying to make many stop changes by hand in a short amount of time. Hopefully, this will be amusing.

- (10) ● show students pipes inside the organ case. Point out different shapes, materials, sizes of pipes, and have organist play while the students are in the organ case.
- (11) ● show the organ blower. Turn it on and off, observing the opening of the reservoirs.
- (12) ● while using many stops, play and release large chords with rests between them; observe the top of the reservoirs adjusting to the winding needs. Contrast with very small registrations and smooth, two-part playing.
- (13) ● perform an organ demonstration piece like *Rex: The King of Instruments* (see resources for additional options.)
- (14) ● let each student play a piano piece on the organ. Register for them, but ask them for ideas as well!

Following the organ demonstrations, plan for all to enjoy pizza and soft drinks. Be sure to have as many Guild members present as possible to interact with the students. Have AGO members share stories of how they came to study the organ and its importance in their lives.

HAND-OUTS (STUDENT PACKETS) COULD INCLUDE:

- an organ pipe to take home.
- pictures of various organs and organ consoles.
- pictures of an organ score, showing three staves, registration markings, etc.; elements different from a piano score.
- list of local organ teachers who will give lessons if piano study is continued. (Be certain to include their contact information.)
- list of POE programs to be given across the country the next summer.
- *A Young Person's Guide to the Pipe Organ* by Soderlund (See resources)
- list of local musical programs of interest.
- schedule of the day for this PPP.

OTHER IMPORTANT ITEMS TO CONSIDER:

Some chapters create a scholarship fund for a series of introductory lessons for those students who indicate an interest. (Please remember that the purpose is as much to interest future *listeners* of the organ as getting some of them to possibly study the organ.) One way to raise funds is to present organ recitals, i.e. Bach's birthday, etc.

Some chapters underwrite the complete cost of the PPP, while others charge a minimal fee to cover event materials.

Timely and attractive publicity is highly important. Letters should be sent to parents of the students. (See sample letter and ad in this booklet). The parents can also be invited to attend the PPP.

Post-PPP Essentials

Following the PPP, it is important to build upon the enthusiasm and excitement of the event to motivate and recruit the next generation of organists. Carefully consider the following ideas; include as many as possible in your chapter's future planning goals. There is only one item on this list; however, it is probably the most important item of this booklet for the success of the PPP program, other AGO programs, and growth of your own AGO Chapter.

1. Maintain a list of all PPP attendees, including name, address, and phone number. This list can be used for:
 - Sending of post-PPP letter to parents and students (see p. 11)
 - POE Recruitment. You can have brochures for the upcoming summer POE's available for the students. These can be obtained by contacting The AGO National Office.
 - Involvement in chapter events
 - Organ Crawls
 - Recitals by young organists
 - Student chapter membership
 - Student organ scholarship information. While AGO national offers student scholarships for POE's, your chapter may want to consider establishing a scholarship fund for young organists in order that may attend POE's, receive organ lessons, or attend other educational music events.

Your chapter may want to consider a mentoring program for young organists. One of the chapter members can be assigned to a student to help guide them through AGO programs, helpful reminder phone calls before chapter events, or offer transportation to AGO events.
